LISTENING TIPS

With last month's feature on the "Big Six" Mutual Aid system have you gone crazy yet? Learning more about this system each week, I have discovered that I do not hear all of the services involved. To hear the entire group you must be able to hear all three repeater sites. Of the fourteen frequencies, 3 are data channels. You should

be hearing these to know that you are receiving the St. Laurent/Outremont/Westmount sites. I hear only one here in LaSalle with another vary faintly if I turn the squelch is turned down to the threshold. During a major blaze in Westmount, I spoke to Jim, VE2VE on the phone at which time a flurry of activity was audible from the some of the St. Laurent apparatus on his scanner but not mine. I am currently experimenting with antennae to try and get the best reception of all three repeater sites. Also y found recently on a multiple casualty incident simulation on a Sunday morning, a new feature of this new repeater system was discovered. When the Department Director and the Incident Commander were overheard saying "go to sideband" their conversation became digitally encrypted (the activation is a button is called "individual call"). They later returned to analogue communications.

VERN ' S MISCELLANEOUS RAMBLINGS

For warm weather events such as EMERGEX or other outdoor events such the upcoming Horse and Carriage events held in the St. Lazare/St. Justine de Newton area, you can freeze bottled water bottles three days before the event, remembering to drain the bottle so that two to two and a half inches of air at the top to allow for expansion when the water freezes. Just throw the bottle in the back seat in the morning just before leaving and by mid-day you should have cold water to drink. In addition, I sometimes leave the cooler and the water bottles under a blanket or my jacket in the back seat or trunk to help keep it cool while in the car. (Thanks to Fred Hart for this great idea)

Proposal To Grant 28.0 To 29.7 MHz Privileges To Basic and 5 WPM Qualifications

Industry Canada has asked for comments on a proposal to allow individuals holding an Amateur Radio Operator Certificate with Basic and Morse code (5 WPM) Qualifications to operate in the 28.0 MHz to 29.7 MHz (10 metre) amateur radio frequency band.

Radio Amateurs of Canada (RAC) submitted the proposal to Industry Canada at the Canadian Amateur Radio Advisory Board meeting held in May 1998, in response to requests from radio amateurs across Canada. Many radio amateurs believe that this would be an important step for the growth and stability of the amateur radio service. It would provide amateurs, who now meet basic international requirements, with the opportunity to operate world wide long distance (DX) communications and to increase their HF operating skills. It is also believed that this proposal would encourage operators with only Basic Qualification to learn Morse code (5 WPM) and increase the overall number of amateurs with HF knowledge and skills.

comes from the May 4, 1999 edition.

ICOM AMERICA INC TO SPLIT INTO US AND CANADIAN ENTITIES

ICOM America Inc will split into two corporate entities--ICOM America and ICOM Canada--on July 1. ICOM America's President Bob Brunkow, K7NHE, will become sole owner of the ICOM Canada distribution business and will head north of the border to take over ICOM Canada as its new president and chairman. Brunkow, 52, has been with ICOM for nearly 28 years. He'll maintain a consulting role with ICOM America after the split, which he said was a result of internal restructuring on ICOM's part.

The Canadian company will be owned and operated independently by Brunkow and his family. Brunkow outlined the changes in an April 19 letter to the ARRL. Brunkow says he'll continue to operate ICOM Canada from its current offices in Richmond, British Columbia, with the existing staff of seven.

Hiro Nakaoka, JK3UZC, will become president of ICOM America. Nakaoka has been with ICOM Inc since 1984 and with ICOM America since 1994.

Brunkow is leaving ICOM America on a high note. He said the company completed its most successful business year ever in March. "It has been an exciting 'run' and a lot of fun seeing ICOM's progress in the North American market during this period of remarkable technological development," he said.

Brunkow said he and his wife, a Canadian, will establish a home in Canada and plan to get Amateur Radio call signs there. But he emphasized that he plans to continue to be a very active ham in the US and involved in the US Amateur Radio community. Brunkow is an ARRL life member. (ARRL Letter, April 30, 1999, American Radio Relay League)
